*Questions to ask:

- 1. Where does this resource come from?
- 2. How does it get to the United States?
- 3. What resources does the United States export to countries?
- 4. What resources does the United States import to countries?
- 5. Why is there a need for countries to trade with other countries?
- 6. What has linked countries/businesses together in the last century?
- 7. In what ways does improved communication and transportation affect global trade?

*VOCABULARY

- 1. Globalization—the process in which countries are increasingly linked to each other through culture and trade.
- 2. Global economy—buying and selling occurs across international borders.
- 3. Interdependence—relationship between countries in which they rely on one another for resources, goods, or services.
- Example—different parts for one car can be made in United States, Canada, France, Germany, Mexico, South Korea, Chile, and Japan.
- 5. Imports—goods brought into a country.
- 6. Exports—goods sold out of a country.
- 7. Multinational corporations—companies that operate in more than one country.
- 8. Natural Resource—any material in nature that people use and value.
- 9. Renewable Resources-resources Earth replaces naturally. Examples would be trees, water, soil, plants, and animals.
- 10. Non-Renewable Resources—resources that cannot be replaced by nature. Examples are metals, minerals, and fossil fuels (coal, petroleum, and natural gas).
- 11. Cash crops—crops sold to make money.

1. Choose one letter of the alphabet.


2. Discover four things from Tennessee that begin with that letter.

3. Write one paragraph (in your own words) about each of the things you chose to represent the state.

4. Illustrate the four things using the format described below.

Your page of the book should be completed in the following manner:

- 1. Divide your paper into five sections (see the example provided in the classroom).
- 2. In the middle, put your letter of the alphabet.
- 3. In the upper left corner, put a picture of an important person from Tennessee and include the person's name and occupation.
- 4. In the upper right corner, put a picture of an important place in Tennessee and include and its name and location.
- 5. In the lower left corner, put a picture of an important Tennessee artifact, resource, or invention and include the name of the item.
- 6. In the lower right corner, put another picture of something important to Tennessee and include its name.
- 7. Divide the back of your paper into five sections also.
- 8. Inside each section on the back, write one paragraph about each of your pictures/illustrations (the accompanying pages provide writing prompts for information to include in your paragraphs).



Use the following questions as a guide for writing each of the paragraphs for your illustrations:

PERSON

1. When was the person born and where?

2. Where did the person attend school and what did they study?

3. What is the person's occupation?

4. Give information about the person's family (parents, spouse, children, grandchildren, pets, etc.)

5. If deceased, when and how did the person die and where is he/she buried?

PLACE

1. What type of place is illustrated (county, city, school, park, etc.)?

2. Give appropriate information relating to the actual location (city and/or county, surrounding cities/counties, physical region, etc.).

3. If the location is a county or city, what is the population? If a school, when was it established and what is its enrollment? If a park, how many people visit annually?

4. Is there anything unique or particularly significant about the location (largest county, oldest city, etc.)?

ARTIFACT, RESOURCE, INVENTION

1. Where did the item originate?

2. Is the item important to Tennessee's economy? If so, how?


3. If the item is a resource, what type (mineral, manufacturing, agriculture, service industry, etc.)?
